Every day, the national media is full of stories about how American families, businesses, and neighbors are adjusting to these trying times. There are so many changes happening so fast that it's dizzying: national debates about unemployment, foreclosures, debt, religion, government and private enterprise all touch on fundamental ways in which we see ourselves and our communities.

For example, the [demise of Borders](#) in Mount Kisco comes amid a national and local economic downturn, and the Food Bank for Westchester's [planned move out of Millwood](#) to a larger facility is a response to growing demand for help. Another example is New Castle's [new local law](#) for AFFH housing units, which reflects desires for some to be able to live in an area they otherwise can't afford.
